

Using Ivermectin for COVID-19 virus

Overdose, can cause vomiting, hypotension, ataxia, seizures, coma, and death.

There have been many reports recently about oral ivermectin treating COVID 19 infections, reducing mortality, speeding recovery and possibly preventing infections after exposure to the COVID-19 virus.

Ivermectin is a Food and Drug Administration (FDA)-approved antiparasitic drug that is used to treat several neglected tropical diseases, including onchocerciasis and helminthiases.

Oral Ivermectin is well-tolerated when used as directed for its approved indication, strongyloidiasis an infection caused by roundworm or off-label for lice and scabies. Adverse effects include nausea, diarrhea, dizziness, itching ¹

In vitro studies of Ivermectin has been shown to inhibit the replication of SARS-CoV-2 virus in cell cultures.² However pharmacokinetic and pharmacodynamic studies show achieving this level for its antiviral effect would require doses up to 100-fold higher than those approved in humans.³

Several meta-analyses have highlighted that the effect of ivermectin in patients with COVID-19 remains uncertain because of a lack of high-quality data. The studies could not find benefit for mortality, recovery, or viral clearance or as prophylaxis. ^{4,5}

The American Medical Association, American Society of Health-System Pharmacists, and the American Pharmacists Association oppose ivermectin use for COVID-19 except in a clinical trial. The National Institute of Health (NIH) guidance recommends neither for nor against ivermectin for COVID-19 treatment due to insufficient evidence.¹

Aetna Medicaid covers Ivermectin in doses and durations consistent with FDA-approved indications. Uses that are not approved, i.e. off-label and that are not supported in standard reference compendia as accepted safe and effective treatments are considered experimental and/or investigational. Such therapies are not a covered benefit.
